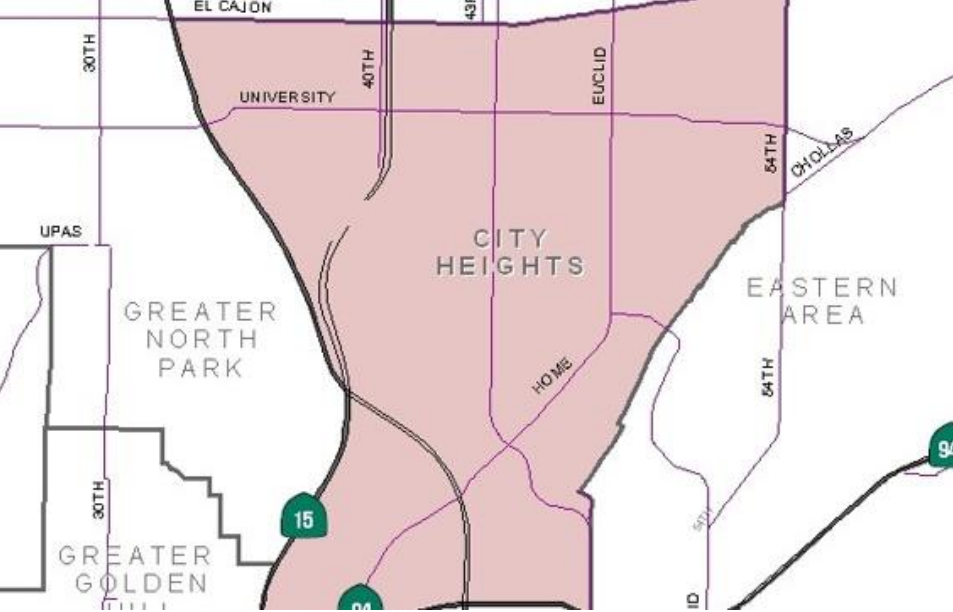

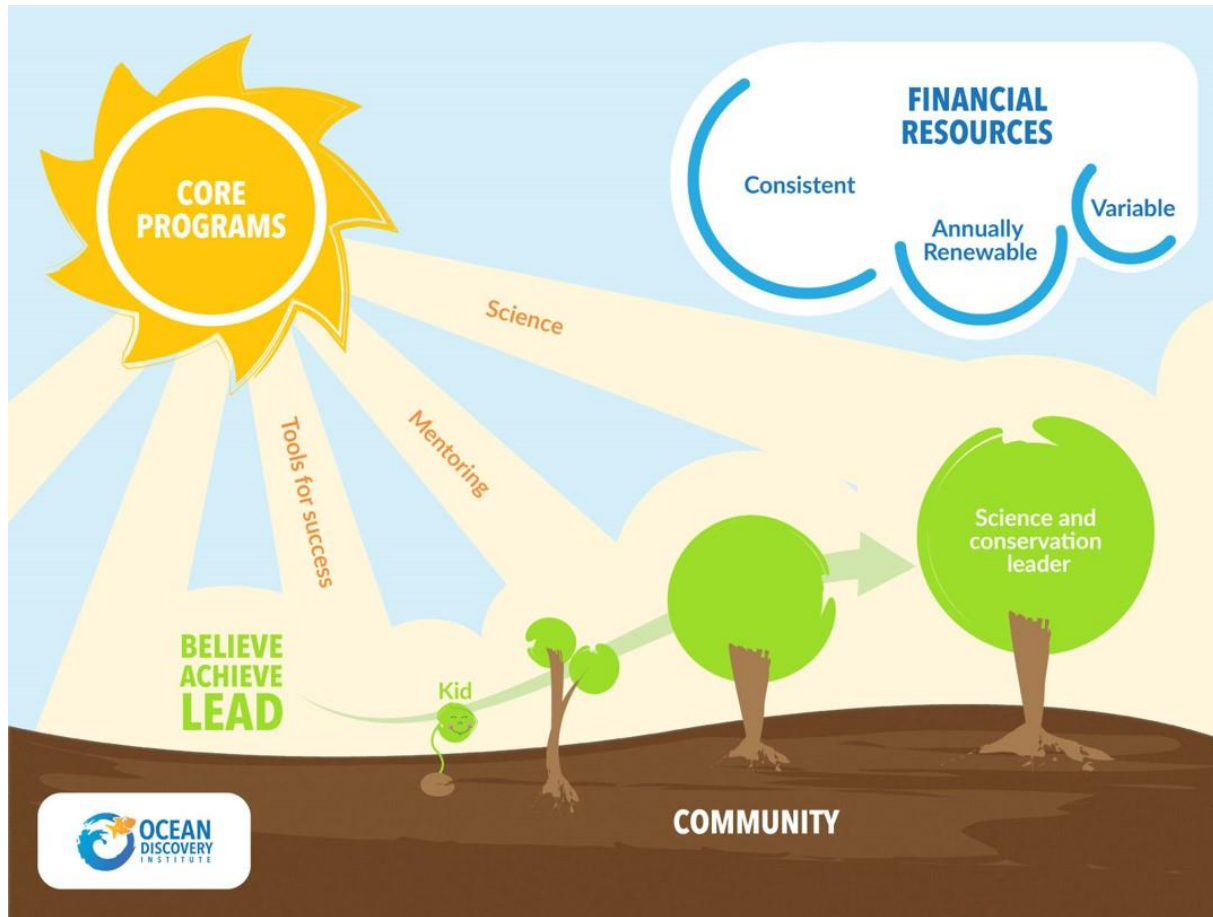

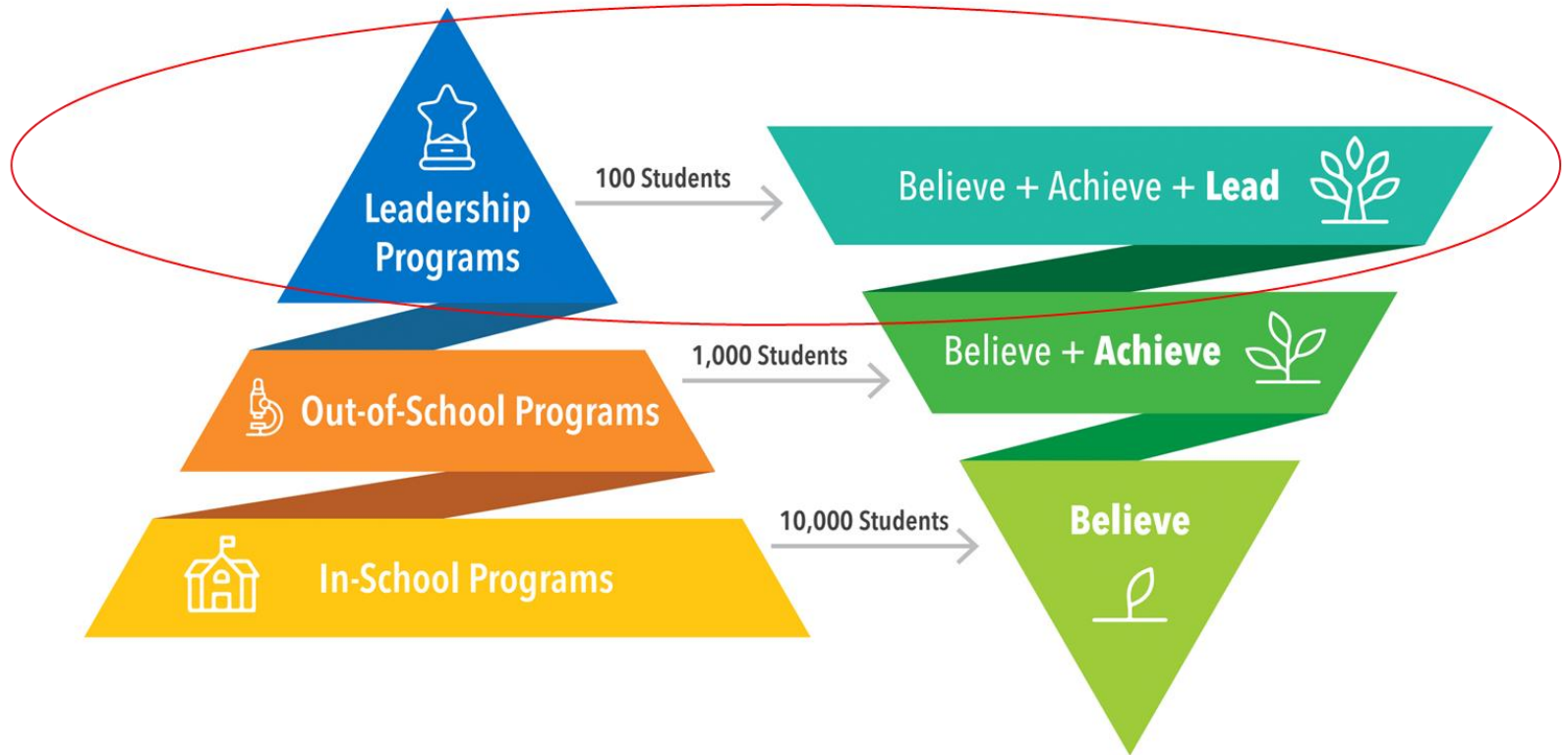

MENTORING MAKES A DIFFERENCE

ADOLESCENT TREE

Age 18+
College

Adolescent trees are becoming first generation college graduates, with degrees in diverse STEM and conservation fields.

95% of students enroll in higher education



Young adults who had mentors as kids are:*

- 55% more likely to be enrolled in college—and more than twice as likely to say they held a leadership position in a club or sports team.
- 78% more likely to volunteer regularly in their communities.
- In a survey, 90% said they are now interested in becoming mentors themselves.

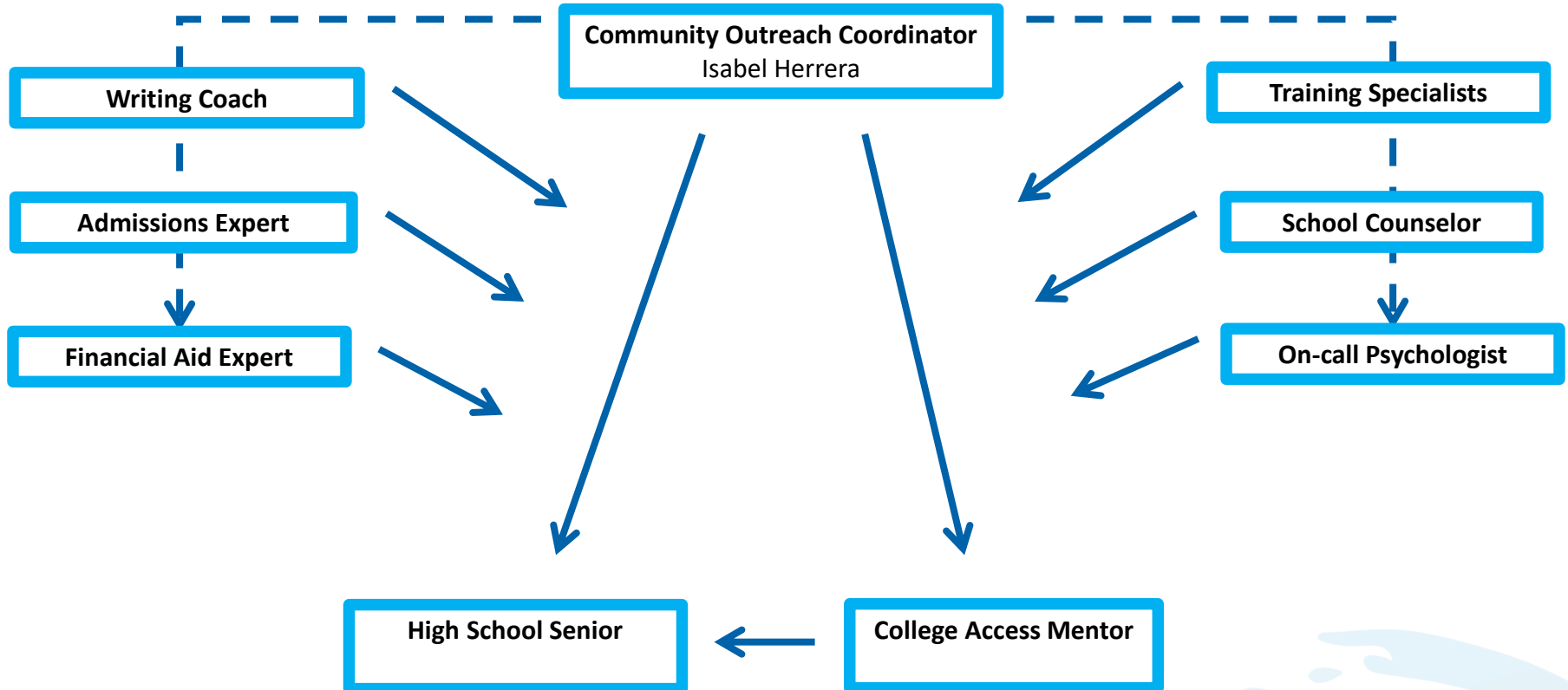


COLLEGE ACCESS MENTOR PROGRAM

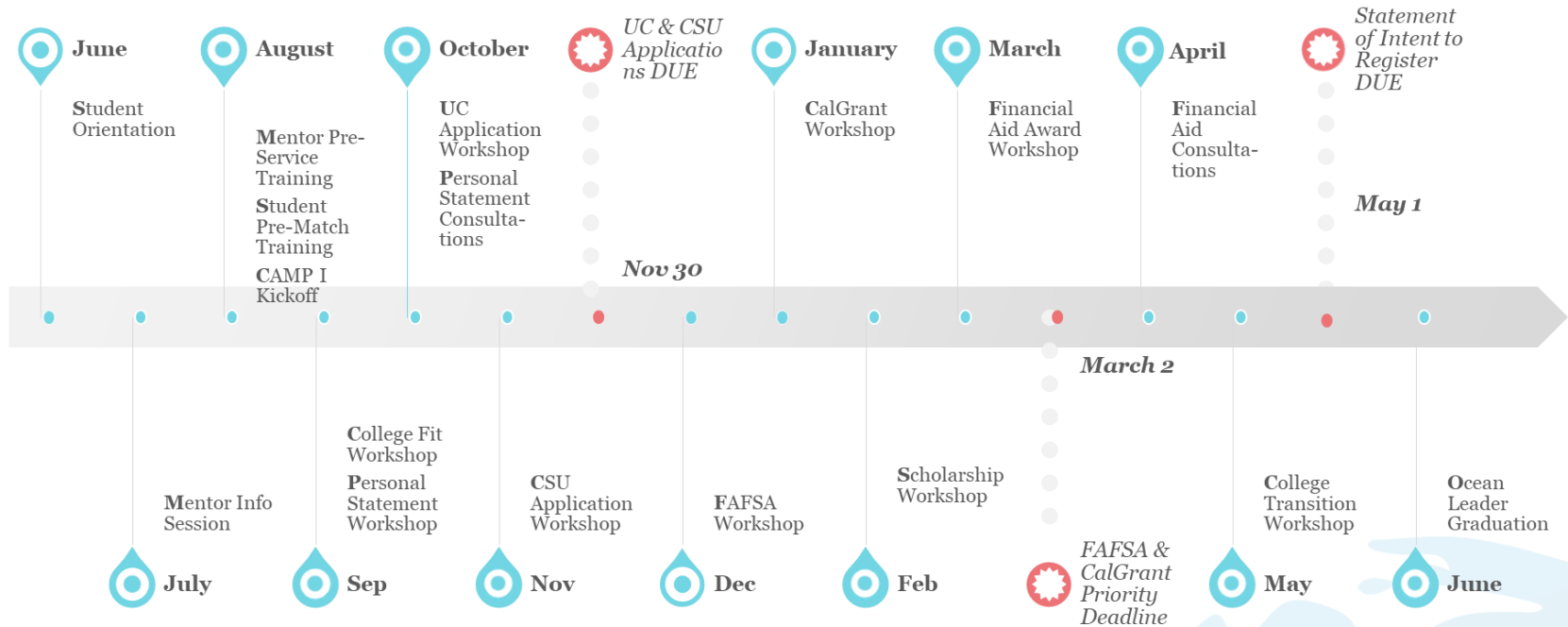

HOOVER HIGH SCHOOL (2019-2020)

Enrollment:

9th grade enrollment: 598

12th grade enrollment: 476 (80%)

High School Graduates: 403 (85%, 67%)

School body population: 2,179

Ethnic diversity of Ocean Leaders reflects diversity of Hoover.

Percent Enrollment for Free or Reduced-Price Meals - 89%

Percent English Learners - 22%

College-Going

UCs - 9%

CSUs - 16%

Community Colleges - 37%

In total, 62% of the graduating class pursued higher education.

WRITING SAMPLE

Continuously I keep growing up and having different experiences in my community I have gone through situations that have only made me stronger such as times in where taking action to lead was really hard and looked quite impossible. Many people had once brought my hopes down as a kid they took advantage of me and my weak skills to stand up for myself. As time passed, I witness the reality of how society expects me to be and the way they want me to be, a low income worker with no future for me. I learned very quickly that it does not matter what types of expectations or stereotypes are put against me, I control my own future and the person who I will become.
